HUMAN TRAFFICKING

What Is It? How Can You Make a Difference?

When: **Sunday January 29, 2-4 pm**

Where: **Lafayette Library and Learning Center**

Sponsored by: AAUW Contra Costa Interbranch Council and Contra Costa County Commission for Women

Come and hear three government and non-profit sector experts from our area: **Jennifer Alderete, special agent with Homeland Securities Investigations, Cindy Liou, staff attorney with Asian Pacific Islander Legal Outreach , and Ms. Caritas Foster with the Holy Family Sisters organization.** They will discuss the scope of the problem (nationally and locally), suggest ways to combat human trafficking, and inform attendees of non-profit and government resources. This program advances education and advocates effective action that can be taken on these issues by AAUW members and the local community.

A “continuation of/addition to” the program our branch held last year, this is a topic that needs to remain in the forefront of everyone’s minds. For this reason CCC IBC chose it as our joint branch - community outreach program. Invite your spouses, friends, neighbors.

TAKE ACTION WITH AAUW

Bullying and sexual harassment have, unfortunately, made big headlines in recent months. After several tragic suicides, new initiatives aimed at preventing bullying and harassment, and AAUW's ground-breaking report on sexual harassment in school, the public and the media are finally paying attention to the critical issue of bullying. Now is the time to pass strong, meaningful anti-bullying and harassment legislation.

Take action: Ask your senators to cosponsor the Student Non-Discrimination Act (S. 555)!

All students deserve a safe and nurturing environment in which to pursue their educational goals. Yet currently, there is no federal law that explicitly protects students on the basis of their actual or perceived sexual orientation or gender identity.

The Student Non-Discrimination Act (SNDA) would do just that. SNDA, which is modeled after other civil rights laws such as Title IX, would protect students from various forms of bullying and harassment, such as sex stereotyping and bullying based on their actual or perceived gender identity, and would give students the ability to enforce protection from discrimination and harassment. AAUW believes it is past time for such a law.

Nathaniel Scott

Do you have any family stories that have been handed down to you from your parents and wondered if they were true? One of my family stories is about my Father's grandfather, Nathaniel Scott. Through research I do know that he was born in Indiana on October 22, 1837, married Margaret Basye October 5, 1859 in Dekalb, Oklahoma, died September 7, 1897 in Stone Co., Missouri and is buried in Oak Grove, Arkansas.

After many years hunting for his grave site I found  it. It is about a two hour drive from Eureka Springs, Arkansas - were some of my family still live. It is a lovely country cemetery on the top of a gently rounded hill with one large, old oak tree in the center. Finding the cemetery was an adventure in itself. It took several years and gave me an opportunity to have a good look at the hills and back roads of Arkansas. While there I took some photos of grave sites around my great grandfather's grave. Something a genealogist should do. A year or so, while emailing a cousin in Arizona, she mentioned that she had been looking for her great grandparents' grave site. I remembered the other names on the tombstones and one of them was her family.

The family story that I have long wondered about is: My  grandfather, Arthur Chester Scott, would often brag about his father fighting in the Civil War on the Union side. When my Dad became interested in genealogy he thought it would be nice to get the war records of Nathaniel Scott, his grandfather, and give them to his father. He hired a professional genealogist to do the research.









My Mom said he was so excited  when the long awaited envelope finally arrived. Well, guess what? Nathaniel Scott was a Confederate! Dad was so upset he tore the papers up and never told his father.

For several years I have tried to verify this story without any luck. Every Nathaniel Scott I could find who fought in the Civil War was on the Union side. Could this professional genealogist have been wrong? At long last, about eight months ago while doing research at the Genealogy Library in Salt Lake City, I found him.

I decided to join the heritage/lineage society, United Daughters of the Confederacy, because this is the 150th year of the beginning of the Civil War. I thought it appropriate to honor my family

This is what genealogy is all about. It as an adventure where you are trying to solve a mystery. You need to know history, geography, be familiar with research techniques, be highly tenacious and have an undying curiosity. It will lead you on some fantastic trips full of unexpected surprises.
